I am deeply thankful for the internship opportunity given by the department of anthropology and Antiquities and Monuments Office. During June and July, 2014, I was granted with the position curator assistant and worked in the archaeological repository in Kwun Chung Municipal Services Building. The colleagues there were helpful, friendly and more than willing to teach me more. My internship experience is fruitful and rewarding.

During my internship period, my major duty was to re-organize all Hong Kong archaeological reports from chronological to regional order, and edit the related computer data accordingly. Other than this task, my colleagues always welcomed me to accompany them to their workplaces so as to enable me to learn more about the nature of AMO, and had hand-on experiences whenever possible. For example, they brought me to Tai Po to visit the celebration of the birthday of Fan Sin Kung.
