Learning outcomes

Upon successfully completing this course, students will have:

- Gained substantial experience playing in and leading recorder ensembles
- Acquired a broad knowledge of the instrument and its repertoire
- Acquired a broad knowledge of the use of the recorder as a tool for teaching music
- Gained experience evaluating learning resources

Learning style

This 2-unit course is interactive, so regular attendance is expected. In addition to playing music, a portion of each class will be devoted to aspects of learning and teaching.

Course description

This course explores teaching, learning, and playing the recorder. It is intended for students whose major instrument is not the

recorder, but who have some experience playing the instrument. The course is aimed at both those who may be considering a career in teaching and those who just like to play the instrument.



Much of the class time will be taken up with ensemble playing. Other learning activities will include the sharing of learning resources. Students will play an active role throughout, introducing materials and leading practice sessions. Depending on the number of students registered in the course, there should be opportunities to play all four main recorders (soprano, alto, tenor, and bass).

Requirements

There are no prerequisites for this course.

Students will need to play recorders in C and F (soprano or tenor and alto or bass) and may use their own instruments or borrow instruments from the Department.

Other learning materials, including sheet music, will be provided on Blackboard. Students may print out their own music or download it to a tablet.

Full attendance is expected and students should arrive for class on time.

Assessment scheme

Classwork (60%)

Project (40%)

Regular class work will account for 60% of the assessment scheme. This will comprise:

- Consistent progress (20%): based on evidence of the student's progress in facility with instruments over the course of the term
- Leadership (20%): effectiveness in playing the role of leading ensembles

 Participation (20%): an overall assessment of the student's engagement in learning, including engaging in discussion of teaching resources

The project (40%) will be to evaluate and demonstrate a teaching resource. This may be a published teaching method, a website, or another type of teaching and learning resource. Students may select from a list of resources or propose another. After introducing resources in class, students will submit reviews (500-600 words in length). Further details will be provided in class and on Blackboard.

Blackboard will be used for courserelated announcements and discussion on the course content.



Health and hygiene
